from the Executive Director



Accent on action

The year 2000-2001 was marked by the implementation of the five-year development plan, whose six broad strategic orientations are aimed at reinforcing our actions and enhancing our organizational performance. This in turn will help us better respond to the aspirations of our participants and the needs of our community partners across the country.

In accordance with the recommendations made by KPMG LP Consulting in its 1999 report, we have introduced an "evaluation framework" that is helping us measure and adjust the organization's performance. As well, the implementation

of *results-based management* was an important step in the continuing improvement of Katimavik's performance. Throughout 2001, we will be conducting an evaluation of the organizational structure and related activities. We will also continue to strictly manage our budget and maintain our commitment to limit administrative expenses, which are already under the 10% mark of total expenditures.

The combined efforts of the Board of Directors and management have helped us build the organization's visibility among both political decision-makers and the general public. As a result, in 2000-2001 we received a record number of applications for the program, despite the fact that due to a lack of funding we were able to offer only a limited number of places. Katimavik also regained its prominence on the international scene by participating in a conference in Jerusalem in June 2000, at which I had the great pleasure of speaking to representatives from 40 member-countries of the International Association of National Youth Services (IANYS). I also led a workshop titled "National Youth Service as a Culturally Integrative Force".

Katimavik has enjoyed a great reputation nationally and internationally ever since it was founded in 1977, evidenced by the fact that 21,469 young Canadian men and women have participated in the program to date. We wish to offer all our former participants the opportunity to contribute to the growth of our organization, through the creation of an Alumni Association. The first step in this ambitious project is to get in touch with all former participants during our visibility campaign planned for the fall of 2002, part of the 25th anniversary celebrations marking Katimavik's foundation.

In the areas of the program's structure and its many learning activities, a "task force" has been formed to conduct an in-depth review of the program and its components. This committee has a three-year mandate to analyse the program structure, its components, and all of its learning activities.

During the past year, we restructured our approach by introducing a new educational philosophy called *Service Learning*, which is already in use in several countries. This model promotes learning through community service and provides recognition for training acquired through volunteer work. The integration of the *Service Learning* approach in our learning program for 2001-2002 will enable Katimavik participants to acquire certified leadership skills that will increase their employability.

Katimavik remains an exceptional meeting place every year for the hundreds of young Canadians who contribute seven months of their lives to serve their community on a volunteer basis, in exchange for acquiring personal and professional skills. Our organization's challenge in the next few years is to continue our efforts to increase our financial ability to give even more young people the chance to participate in the Katimavik program.

Katimavik continues to gain recognition on both the Canadian and international scenes. Thanks to our established reputation and energetic advertising initiatives, more young Canadians than ever are joining the program and we are receiving many more applications than we can accept. We are a youth organization that is increasingly in demand, and are now recognized as a core member of the International Association of National Youth Services (IANYS).

Following several meetings with Exchanges Canada, we have managed to obtain a new Contribution Agreement: we can now count on a minimum annual funding of \$11.6 million.

We have attained our goals in all key areas of our activities as a result of the commitment by Katimavik management to respect our strategic orientations by tackling numerous organizational challenges.

We have introduced a multifaceted initiative in order to diversify program financing. The Katimavik Foundation, a registered charity, and the Katimavik Fund, a non-profit organization, will help us develop our philanthropic activities and establish corporate financial partnerships. We are also building a strong Alumni Association.

While we continue to develop the Governance Policies adopted in 1997, new procedures have also been introduced. Furthermore, to support corporate development and lobbying efforts, we have recruited new members of the Board of Directors to maximize our networking abilities.

We are maintaining our organizational consolidation efforts without sacrificing program quality. While we continue to respect the program's core educational values, we are proud to integrate the *Service Learning* approach, which will foster the development of participants' leadership skills.

During the 2000-2001 year, we implemented our strategic plan, which is aimed at strengthening our position as the nation's leading youth program. We are confident that 2001-2002 will be as productive, now that we have the necessary means. The year 2002 will also mark the 25th anniversary of the founding of Katimavik, a milestone that members of the Katimavik team across Canada plan to celebrate together with all of our participants, alumni and community partners.


Katimavik Program

Katimavik offers young Canadian men and women aged 17 to 21 an opportunity to participate in a learning experience that will help them improve their interpersonal and professional skills, while making a significant contribution through their volunteer work, to the development of communities across the country.

For seven months, Katimavik participants live in groups of 11, guided by a Project

Leader, in three different regions of Canada — one of them mainly French-speaking. Each group comprises a proportion as equal as possible of young men and women from all parts of Canada, reflecting the country's cultural, economic and social diversity. In addition, during their sojourns in the three regions, participants spend a total of nine days with host families, in order to better absorb the local culture.

The Katimavik program is based on the concept of *Service Learning*, an educational approach that encourages learning through volunteer work in the community. This 35 hours a week commitment helps participants to acquire a variety of experience, develop their skills and learn to assume responsibility, thus preparing them better to either return to school or enter the job market. Besides ensuring that they acquire a diversity of knowledge through this volunteer work, Katimavik provides them with ongoing training through its five learning programs:

Katimavik offers its participants a wide variety of valuable learning and beneficial experiences in an exciting atmosphere. Participants develop their sense of leadership, complete projects, join in all sorts of activities and tackle stimulating challenges. In an open environment that encourages initiative, these young people feel that they and their peers, all eager to broaden their horizons and see how others live, have real power to take action and bring about change — for themselves and others. The vast majority of participants look back at Katimavik as an experience that gave them confidence in their future and their potential.



Activities Report

Focus on leadership

The summer of 2000 saw the introduction of two new, shorter programs, with age groups on both sides of that of the original seven-month Katimavik program (17 to 21). The Leader 16-19 and LeaderPlus 22-26 summer programs were designed to explore the viability of six- and nine-week programs devoted to leadership within a Katimavik learning environment. More than 7,000 applications were received for all three programs combined, with 5,000 for the regular Katimavik program alone. The focus on leadership in the two new programs proved to be successful, but some of Katimavik's main objectives — such as community service, second language and cultural diversity — were not being met; hence, the integration of the leadership development plan in the overall Katimavik program for 2001-2002.

In 2000-2001, a total of 876 participants (726 for Katimavik and 150 for the summer programs) were given the opportunity to acquire a variety of useful experiences working as volunteers on local projects in communities across the country, learning new skills, and developing group interaction techniques. In return, these participants provided 444,020 hours of volunteer work to 420 community organizations in 74 communities across the country. These community partnerships are the essence of our program, providing our youth with a life-size laboratory to explore and tackle stimulating challenges, in exchange for the completion of long-standing community projects.

Service Learning

Katimavik's participation in the International Association of National Youth Services (IANYS), an international movement that recognizes the benefits of youth and volunteering, helped us to restate the importance of *Service Learning* as a key component in the Katimavik program, and of our role in mobilizing our nation's youth. In Canada, Katimavik has been at the forefront of this movement, which allies volunteer work with learning and helps both participants and communities to develop. As a result, we redefined the overall impact of *Service Learning* in our educational model and will highlight the benefits of such a model for our society and our youth.

Building for our future

The year was also marked by the creation of three new Katimavik entities: the Katimavik Fund, the Katimavik Foundation, and Katimavik Youth Services. These legal entities were introduced with the aim of, respectively, diversifying our sources of funding, establishing a structure for fund-raising, and varying the types of programs to be offered in the future. To this effect, the NAVION consulting firm conducted a feasibility study to evaluate Katimavik's fund-raising potential and future prospects for the diversification of funding.

Alumni Association

With more than 21,000 participants in our program since 1977, the creation of the Alumni Association, one of the six strategic orientations within our five-year development plan, was received with great enthusiasm. An alumni association coordinator was hired and the DonorPerfect fund-raising system was adopted to help manage future communications with our alumni. A call centre with three employees was also created to validate the names and addresses of alumni and staff; therefore consolidating our database for future endeavours. With these elements in place, this coming year will see the outset of the best associative model to favour constructive links with our alumni for years to come.

Katimavik 2000 Tour

A major highlight of the year was last summer's cross-country tour of more than 20,000 kilometres aboard a camper-van undertaken by Jacques Hébert, the Founding President of Katimavik. Mr. Hébert travelled across Canada meeting mayors, community members, past and present participants, politicians, host families and Katimavik staff. The objective was to increase Canadians' awareness of the impact and scope of the work accomplished by Katimavik over the last 20 years, and to reinforce their perception of the relevance of the program for our youth and our communities. The tour was a great success, obtaining a great deal of media coverage and leading to the production of three promotional videos destined for future community partners and participants. Mr. Hébert has written a book entitled *KATIMA*... *WHAT?*, recounting his experiences from Newfoundland to the Yukon during the Katimavik 2000 Tour.

Auditors' Report

to the Directors

We have audited the statement of financial position of Corporation Katimavik - Opcan as at March 31, 2001 and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Corporation's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

As it is described in note 2 (a), the Corporation has not recorded some assets and liabilities considering that these offset each other and the net result is nil. For this consideration only, these financial statements are not in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except for the unrecorded items discussed in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Corporation as at March 31, 2001 and the results of its activities and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The current year's supplementary information included in the Schedule - Detail of Expenses is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such supplementary information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended March 31, 2001

Corporation Katimavik - Opcan ("The Corporation") is a non-profit organization incorporated under Part II of the Law governing Canadian corporations. The principal activity of the Corporation consists of promoting the development of young adults between the ages of 17 and 21 years old, through a stimulating program that involves volunteer community work, training and group interaction.

1. Financing activities:

a) Existing subsidy agreement:

These financial statements were prepared on a going concern basis, which means the Corporation will pay off its debts in the normal course of its activities. The ability of the Corporation to function as a going concern depends on the continued financial support of government subsidies. If such an hypothesis was not founded, major adjustments in the value of assets and liabilities could be necessary.

b) New subsidy agreement:

A new subsidy agreement was signed on August 16, 2000 between the Ministry of Canadian Heritage and the Corporation Katimavik - Opcan. This agreement has a value of \$24,411,903, of which \$7,131,903 has been paid during the year. This agreement covers the period of July 1, 2000 to March 31, 2003. In addition, the Corporation is waiting for the approval of an amendment which will add a supplementary subsidy of \$3,000,000 to be received in 2002. In return, the Corporation is committed to respect some conditions defined in the agreement.

The maximum subsidy for this agreement and the amendment, if approved, would be given over the next two years according to the above:

2. Significant accounting policies:

a) Departure:

The Corporation's operations are recorded in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles except for the unrecorded provision for perseverance bonuses to take into account the requirement of the Ministry of Canadian Heritage. The perseverance bonuses are recorded on a cash basis. Therefore, no provision was recorded for these bonuses as at March 31, 2001 and 2000.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued):

a) Departure (continued):

If a provision for perseverance bonuses in the amount of \$640,000 (2000 - \$650,000) had been recorded as at March 31, 2001 and 2000, the following balances would have been presented in the Corporation's financial statements:

c) Revenue recognition and deferred contributions:

The deferral method is used to record contributions.

Restricted contributions, which are those tied by an obligation of required use, are recognized as revenue in the year during which the related charges are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year during which they are received.

Contributions restricted for the purchase of capital assets are deferred and amortized on a straight-line basis, at a rate corresponding to the amortization rate for the related equipment.

d) Contributions and sponsorship in kind:

Contributions and sponsorship in the form of capital assets are accounted for at their fair value at the date of the donation or the agreement's date. A capital asset and a deferred

contribution are then recognized in the balance sheet and amortized in accordance with the accounting policies in note 2 (b).

Contributions and sponsorship in the form of supplies and services are accounted for at their fair value at the date of the donation or the agreement's date. A revenue and an expense are then recognized in the statement of operations.

e) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from such estimates.

7. Contributions of rendered services:

The contributions in the form of rendered services represent the value of the non-remunerated contribution provided by the elective participants. For 2001, the value of this contribution totalled \$6,167,436 (2000 - \$2,775,435). This amount was obtained from a study conducted during the year on the number of hours of community work performed, being 444,020 hours (2000 - 444,070 hours). The hours worked in the year ended 2001 were valued at the average rate of \$13.89/hour, calculated on the basis of data established by Statistics Canada representing the economic value of volunteer work based on job estimates, the average hourly remuneration and the hours of hourly paid employees in the socio-cultural, community and people services of Canada. For the year ended in 2000, the hours were valued at \$6.25/hour based on the average minimum hourly wage in Canada.

These contributions which were received free of charge are accounted for both as a revenue and as a charge and, therefore, have no impact on the year's excess of revenues over expenses (expenses over revenues).

8. Other revenue and sponsorship in kind:

In the course of its normal business, the Corporation receives free of charge various supplies and services. This sponsorship in kind is recorded at its market value. The following table represents the amounts included in the Corporation's expenses with respect to these donations:

Katimavik Fund:

Katimavik Fund was incorporated by letters patent on March 29, 2000. The object of this Corporation is to receive donations, bequests and other contributions, to manage and to distribute those funds to Corporation Katimavik - Opcan or any other related organization.

As at March 31, 2001, Corporation Katimavik - Opcan recorded an amount of \$42,892 as expense reimbursement (contributions for the start-up of The Katimavik Fund of \$200,000 in 2000). Of this amount, \$3,763 is receivable as at March 31, 2001 (nil in 2000).
